The institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. The IQAC conducts meetings with the faculty members at the beginning of the academic year and the scope of syllabus methodology of teaching, subject allocations etc are finalised. The respective departments prepare lesson plans scheme of evaluations, according to the guidelines of the affiliating university. The allocated syllabus for the day is updated in the work diary. Internal tests are conducted and results are informed to the students. Teachers are encouraged to participate in workshops and seminars on curriculum development and implementation organized by respect subject forums, college teachers association etc. Guest and invited lectures are arranged on respective subjects/areas of syllabus. Departmental meetings are convened to develop curriculum implementation strategies. Industrial visits, project works, assignments etc. provide a practical edge to classroom teaching. Previous University Question papers, model question papers and scheme of evaluation are put together in the library as well as the respective departments for the benefit of the students. The Department of English enacted the play called Julius Caesar from the students as a part of syllabus for the B.A.final year optional English students.
