1.1 INTRODUCTION

It is running with the blessings of Shree Khasgat Shivayogi the Sangha has made a significant progress by establishing educational institutions ranging from KG to UG and Professional course like B.Ed. which is established in 2016 With the Dynamic Management Team and collective efforts of members. VV Sangha has 08 various Institutions, 3770 students, 140 faculties

Shree Khasgatesh College of Arts, Commerce and Science was established in 1977 with Arts and Commerce programmes In 2018 Science programme was introduced. It is affiliated to Rani Channamima Univesity. Belagavi. At present 1040 students are studying 32 faculty members are engaged in the pursuit of academic excellence. It made its humble beginning with meagre number of just 70 students, and the strength has now crossed 1040 students.

The campus has 6.35 Acres of land with a state of the art facility for constructive: learning experience. The campus is decorated by greening efforts like flower garden. coconut trees and medicinal plants.

- Most of the students are from rural and Kannada medium background. They are not only economically backward but are also poor in the English.
- The college does not have a full fledged auditorium in the campus.
- Delayed sanctioning of permanent teaching and non-teaching positions by the government.
- Less numbers of MOU's collaborations with industry and other institutions.
- Since it is an aided institution the amount of grant by the government is insufficient.
- The rural setting of the locality with poor industrialization. The placement ratio of the institution is not up to the mark.
- The limitation on the financial support to the unaided component of the salary and recurring grant limits the efficacy of the system.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The institution affiliated to Rani Channamma Belagavi and it adheres to the mandate CBCS regulations pertaining to UG programmes. The CBCS has been introduced in 2020-21. Presently NEP is introduced. IQAC plays a vital role in efficient planning, transaction and evaluation of curricular aspect. The institution believes in realising the curricular aspects by defining programme outcome, programme specific outcome and course outcomes.

The IQAC monitors the curriculum planning of the institution through a well documented procedure which involves a strategic plan, academic calendar, Departmental teaching plans, teachers dairy, Learning Materials, result analysis, online student feedback system etc.

The institution adheres to the norms prescribed by affiliating university with respect to Continuous Internal Evaluation system (CIE). The students are made aware of the academic calendar, curricular review development is done regularly to keep in pace with developments in respective fields to meet the requirements of academia, industry, profession and society. The institution is having a handbook on the code of conducts to be followed by the staff and students which are helpful in imbibing professional ethics and human values.

The institution encourages faculty members to take part in syllabus framing, question paper setting and evaluation process. During the assessment period the institution has 08 academic programmes 01 certificate course and 02 value added courses.

Good infrastructure, ICT facility, well equipped laboratories, library with NLIST resources make curricular aspects more effective. In curricular aspects the greater emphasis is given address the cross cutting issues like gender, environmental sustainability, human values professional ethics and skills by organising various programmes for the holistic development of students. Faculty members are deputed to National and International level conferences, seminars, workshops and symposiums to update their knowledge.

Feedback on syllabus is obtained from the Students, Teachers Alumni and Employers. The analysis of the feedback is carried away and placed before the Board of Studies of Affiliating University and is available on the college website.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The institution provides admission to all the eligible students according to the norms of affiliating university. An admission committee comprising of Teachers and Administrative staff ensures the admission form various categories as per the norms of reservation policy of the government.

After the completion of admission process an Orientation Programme is arranged for the freshers. The college focuses on assessing the various learning levels of the students and organises special programmes for both advanced and slow learners. Study materials and books are provided to advanced learners and remedial classes are engaged for slow learners.

The college encourages the students to expose to experimental learning, Participative learning and problem solving methodologies. The college ensures ICT enabled learning management system and other e-resources.

The institution has an effective mentoring system which addresses the students' academic performance, personal issues, discipline coupled with counselling by teachers. Along with academic activities co-curricular and extra-curricular activities are organised for the overall development of the students. The college has Career Guidance and Counselling Cell which prepares students for various competitive examinations and career opportunities by organising workshops and training programmes.

Teachers upgrade their qualification and knowledge by pursuing Ph.D. and research work. The institution has an effective grievance handling mechanism. The internal assessment is done based on assignments, presentation skills, student's attendance and test papers. The examination committee of the institution conduct internal examinations according to the guidelines of Parent University.

Pos, PSOs and Cos are well stated, displayed on the college website and communicated to the students. The results are analysed on all parameters. Student satisfaction survey is conducted.

The IQAC prepares academic calendar and all the HOD's effectively implement the same. It monitors the teaching plans, learning outcomes and the resources used by the faculties in their teaching learning process.

Faculty members organise educational tours, industrial visits and historical visit for students. The institution organises special lectures. National / State level seminars, workshops which help the students to enrich their knowledge, creative thinking and entrepreneurship qualities. The faculty members use Google Classroom, Teach mint, Google Meet: Zoom. YouTube etc. to deliver the course Content through online mode.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The college encourages faculty members to undertake research activities. At the college level there is a research committee to promote research and innovation. The institution has organised one webinar on IPR. The institution extends maximum possible support to promote the research culture in the college.

The faculty members published 04 Books and published 69 research articles in the National and International level conferences and workshops.

The college has initiated various extension activities in the neighbourhood to address the social, health and environmental issues. The college has two NSS units and one NCC unit, YRC, Eco-Club etc for conducting extension activities. These units involved in outreach programmes like Swachch Bharat Abhiyan, Polio eradication programme, Plantation drive, AIDS awareness programme, Voting awareness programme etc. During the last five years more than 90 activities were conducted by these units.

Under MOU activities with other institution and organisations the college has organised many programmes. 02 faculty members engaged online classes under faculty exchange programme during COVID-19 pandemic period. There are 4 MoU's with academic/Non-Governmental agencies. Collaboration is made with S.K.P.U.College regarding Sports activities.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The institution has adequate infrastructure facilities for effective institutional functioning, regular maintenance and augmentation of infrastructure is equally taken care of. The campus is set in 6.35 Acres and the total built up area is 2175.00 Sq Mt. There are 17 lecture halls, 07 classrooms with ICT facility and 02 Smart Classrooms and one ICT enabled seminar hall with 200 seating capacity. Five well equipped laboratories. (Two Chemistry 01 Physics, 01 Zoology and 01 Botany lab) One Computer lab with 30 Computers. Additionally laptops are provided to faculty members.

There is a well established library with 100 seating capacity. A collection of 36,100 books, 162 CD's of various discipline. 38 Journals 10 News papers and journals, 6000 e-journals, 31, 35,000e-books through NLIST programme. Additional books are provided to differently able students. News paper clippings are collected regarding college events. Staff publications, new arrivals are displayed in the library showcase. WEB OPAC is provided. **06** computers, INFLIBNET facility and LAN facility an e-Zone facility are available for both Staff and students

IT infrastructure is maintained and upgraded on regular basis by having a service agreement with a private agency. The college has internet facility with two dedicated line having each 100 Mbps FTTH connections.

There is a committee for maintenance of infrastructure facilities. Two Multi Gyms, Vast Play grounds measuring 04 Acres and there are 02 Hostels. There is one eco friendly generator. Whole campus has been installed with CCTV surveillance. There are Security personnel to guard the campus.

Student Support and Progression

The college provides various facilities and encourages students participation in co-curricular and extracurricular activities. Along with Government scholarships and Non-Government scholarships, the institution provides financial support to economically weaker and meritorious students. The staff members also provide the financial support to economically weaker students. The financial and non-financial support is provided who excel in sports.

The Career Guidance and Counseling Cell arrange workshops and training programmes to prepare the students for competitive world. Women empowerment cell, NSS Cells and Kannada Department organizes capacity enhancement programs for the students for improving their life skills including Yoga, Health and hygiene. These cells also organize Health Checkup camp, Blood Donation camp, Eye Checkup camp etc. through which they render very valuable service to the society.

We have a student union consisting of one general secretary, One Joint Secretary and class representatives nominated on the basis of their performance in the previous class.

The grievance Redressal cell in the college resolves the academic and administrative grievances.

Total number of students progressing to higher education during the last five years is 91.

Our students have participated in many sports and cultural events. Our student Ketan Ganachari has

Alumni contributed Rs.35,000/- during the year 2019-20. In case of sports events, an alumnus contributes in kind form such as caps, T-Shirt, Medals, and Shields etc.

Governance, Leadership and Management

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response:

The College believes in attaining academic excellence with a well planned curriculum delivery to the students. The curriculum of all the courses is designed by the Parent University and hence the college follows the academic calendar of the Parent University. The IQAC prepares the calendar of events of the college in consultation with HOD's of all the Departments. The Time Table Committee prepares the college Time Table. The HOD's of all the Departments prepare their Department Time Table as well as Individual Time Table and further it is submitted to the Principal for final approval. The College organises the Orientation Programme for the Fresher's to introduce the college to the new comers. In the Orientation programme the knowledge of Course Outcome, Programme Outcome and Programme Specific Outcomes are intimated to the students. Bridge Courses are organised by some Departments where ever necessary to provide the knowledge of core subjects of UG Courses where in the students have not studied those subjects in their previous year. The curriculum delivery involves various innovative teaching methodologies like Special Lectures, Use of ICT, Assignments, Seminar, Group Discussion, Field Visits and Study Tours, etc. The Guest Lectures are organised by all the Departments to impart in-depth knowledge of various topics. The Value Added and Certificate Courses enhance the knowledge and skill of students. Involvement of faculty members in research activities adds to the delivery of more research based curriculum to the students. The participation of faculty members as BOS member creates more confidential to the college. Students are provided with the study materials necessary for learning but at the same time they are encouraged and trained to prepare their own study materials by using library and e-resources. The library provides BookBank facility, OPAC, Shodaganga, e-journals, etc. The faculty members also provide reference books to students. Two internal examinations are conducted apart from class tests according to University guidelines. The performance of the students is communicated by the respective teachers and further guidance is provided for implementation. For upgrading the existing knowledge the college organises Seminars, Webinars, and Workshops and also make students to participate in other college Academic activities. Academic and Administrative Audit is conducted once in Five years by IQAC and necessary feedback is collected from the experts. Remedial Classes are conducted for slow learners. A mentor mentee system is in place to take holistic care of the students with focus on the needs of individual students. The feedback on curriculum is regularly collected from students, parents, teachers and alumni at the end of the course and analyses are documented.

The IQAC prepares the academic calendar in tune with the academic calendar of University where in the utmost importance is given to the Continuous Internal Evaluation of students. The CIE involves two Internal Assessment Tests (IA), Unit Tests, Semester End Examination, Assignments, etc. The students are made aware of the evaluation process during the induction programme held at the beginning of the First Semester. Teaching plan and CIE are made as per the academic calendar. Change in syllabus and evaluation process if any, is brought to the notice of the students. The Continuous Internal Evaluation is done in two levels by the institution. Institution Level According to the Parent University guidelines the action plan is prepared for conducting Continuous Internal Evaluation. Theory Internal Tests for 20 marks is conducted at the institution level and for 80 marks it is conducted as per the norms of the University. The practical exams are conducted by the college under the scrutiny Internal and External Examiners appointed by the University. In addition, the students have the option to join Certificate and Value Added Courses as; per their interest and examinations are conducted by the respective Department. Students are continuously evaluated through observation of their participation in curricular and co-curricular activities. At the University level examinations are conducted at the end of each semester according to the guidelines of the University. The college has the exam centre status and facilitates for solving the grievances of the students regarding corrections in marks card correction in names, revaluation, photocopy of answer sheets, etc. At present the students can do these works through their on-line portal. 2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

The students are differ in their learning abilities like grasping power, understanding the concepts, application of knowledge, etc. Therefore, the institution has adopted policy to identify advanced learners and slow learners.

The parameter or policy framed for identification of slow learners and advanced learners: The performance of students in the previous year examination is analysed to identify the advanced learners and slow learners. This is the most widely accepted method to classify the students in to two categories;

- Above 70% are Advanced Learners.
- Below 50% are Slow Learners.

The strategies employed for Advanced Learners:

The students who score 70% and above are classified as the advanced learners and the institution adopts the following strategies to fulfil their thrust of learning and to excel in their carrier development process:

- Provision of extra book facility: Apart from library books, faculty members also provide reference books.
- Seminars and Presentations: Seminars and presentations are given to them to develop communication skills, self confidence and research culture.
- Organisation of Department and College functions: They are motivated to organise department and college functions, participation in extension activities develop leadership qualities.
- Authority and Responsibility: On the basis of previous year exams marks Class Representatives are nominated. Among the class representatives the top scorer will be the General Secretary of the college. These class representatives act as members of various associations, committees, etc. This enables them to develop organisational and decision making skills.

The strategies employed for slow learners:

These are the students whose learning ability is less than the standard. In order to uplift these students the following strategies have been adopted:

- Remedial Classes: Remedial classes are conducted by the respective subject teachers to improve their learning ability.
- Notes: Simple notes are provided for reference and also
- Personal Counselling: In the personal counselling the problems of the students are identified and guidance is given to them on writing notes and solving question papers.
- Mentor Mentee Scheme: Under this scheme personal care is given to the slow learners.

Outcomes of Advanced Learners:

- Because of the strategies adopted by the institution the number of centum scorer is increasing.
- Our students are serving in educational department, revenue department, police department, banks, corporate, etc.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Response:

The college adopts student's centric methods that focus on overall development of the students and also prepare them to the present requirements. The college has desirable and value based methods to explore the abilities and strengths of students. Participative, Experiential and Problem solving methods are used for overall development of the students.

Participative Methods:

The participative learning methods are introduced in classroom activities, students will be provided a platform to participate in learning interacting expressing and exploring different concepts of subjects. They learn through observing, listening, writing, presenting and discussing processes. ICT based seminars and presentations, value based talks, guest lectures, group discussions, subject related movies, etc are involved in this methods. This method is implemented in the classes were the students strength is less. The language departments like Kannada, English and Hindi conduct debate and speech competitions. The Science section conducts quiz competitions.

Participative learning provides ambiance to accommodate the intellectual diversity of the students and they feel that they are involved in learning process. In the curriculum delivery plan teachers plan to organise these activities for giving opportunities to the students to involve in participative learning process.

Experiential Learning:

Here, students learn through hands on activities. They learn about planning, organising, decision-making and execution processes. Study tours, industrial visits, field visits, projects, exhibitions, food mela, etc are some critical methods employed through which students have practical experience. Apart from these the students are encouraged and trained to present papers in seminars/conferences organised by higher educational institutions. Participation in poster making, rangolli competition, etc boost their self esteem.

Problem Solving Methods:

Problem solving methods have been adopted mainly for the students of Commerce and Science. Case-studies, brainstorming sessions. Preparation of business plans, analysis and interpretation of financial statements are the methods employed here. These activities enable the students to recognise the problem to find alternative solutions and ultimately find out a best solution. The faculty of the institution guide the students in critical and creative thinking by engaging them in challenging tasks during course period.

Online Teaching Methods:

During Covid-19 pandemic period online teaching methods are used to cope up with the situation. Google classroom, Google meet, zoom app, you tube challan are adopted by the faculty members to teach the students in this challenging time. The faculty members also provided notes, study materials, you tube videos, etc through different ICT tools. Hence, the institution has adopted various approaches holistically for enhancing learning experience of the students.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode

Response:

The college is affiliated to Rani Channamma University, Belagavi and hence follows the academic calendar of the parent university in conducting internal examinations. The rules and regulations of evaluation process laid down by the affiliating university are communicated to the students through orientation programme organised in the beginning of the academic year. The Examination Committee prepares internal tests time table in tune with affiliating university calendar. The internal marks are awarded to the students according to parameters prescribed by the university. For theory subjects 20 marks. This is again splitted into four components such as 3 marks for attendance, 3 marks for assignments and seminars, 4 marks for First internal test and 10 marks for second internal test. For practical subjects 10 marks divided into two parts as 3 marks for attendance and 7 for write up.

Frequency: The First Internal Test is decentralised by the concerned departments as per the time table given by the examination committee for 20 marks.

The second internal test is organised in centralised system by the examination committee. The time table is displayed on the notice board well in advance. The committee collects question papers from all the departments in the format prescribed by the university.

The concerned departments collect assignments from the students. The practical internal tests for the science streams are conducted according to the format of the parent university.

Transparency: As soon as the evaluation process completes the internal test marks are finalised and displayed on the notice boards. Signature of the students is taken to IA marks statements to maintain transparency in the process. The final IA marks will be uploaded to the university in the OASIS software tool. From the academic year 2019-20 the internal marks can be viewed by the students in the student portal.

For students who participate in sports events, NCC and NSS activities internal tests are conducted separately. The student grievances if any are addressed by the HOD's of respective departments.

The Examination committee conducts both internal tests systematically in tune with university guidelines. Proper seating arrangements, error free question papers, monitoring the examination process by the Examination Committee, etc are the robust policies adopted by the institution to make the internal assessment more transparent and effective.

2.5.2 Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

Response:

The Examination Committee ensures smooth conduct of internal examination according to the guidelines of the parent university.

The date of internal examination is announced ten days or one week before the date of examination. The pattern of examination is informed to the students well in advance. After conducting the examinations answer scripts are evaluated and marks are brought to the notice of the students. The doubts and queries of the students regarding their obtained marks are clarified by the concerned teachers. The students whose performance is good are appreciated and whose performance is not satisfactory are guided. The attainment of COs and POs are usually defined in the beginning of the course. The outcomes are defined by the concerned departments and are reviewed by the IQAC. The parent university sets question papers for the semester end examinations and the papers are evaluated by the faculty members of other institutions. The question paper pattern for most of the subject contains four sections A,B,C & D. Except section D all other sections have choices to answer. Hence, students will concentrate on 3 or 4 modules only. So it is difficult to assess the attainment of POs and COs.

Our college has adopted the following methods to assess the students performance as far as attainment of POs and COs.

- Performance of students in examination.
- Performance of students in seminars, group discussion, etc.
- Pursuing higher studies and professional courses.
- Appearing in competitive examinations.
- Participation and placements in job drives.
- Leadership qualities in organising co-curricular activities.
- The feedback from alumni on the programme outcomes by their satisfaction with regard to their graduation.

The POs and COs attainment is evaluated by using Direct and Indirect Method.

1. Direct Method:

In this method student's performance in internal tests, assignments, seminars, quizzes, projects, lab tests

and result analysis of semester end examination are major tools used for assessing the attainment level of students relating to all the outcomes. Major portion of the assessment is done through this method.

The respective subject teachers analyse the results and interact with the students. If any deficiency in attainment will be compensated through counselling.

2. Indirect Method:

Here progression of students to higher studies, placement of students, clearing competitive exams, involvement of students in business ventures, etc are considered to assess the attainment level of students. The effective feedback system of students, alumni and employer throws light on the attainment process of outcomes.

Evidence of PO attainment:

Good number of centum scorers and top scorers in all programmes. The students participate in NSS, NCC and YRC inculcate the human values, ethics and leadership qualities. The performance of sports department is another evidence. Every year the college organises zonal and inter zonal level sports events and contributes a good number of blues to university.

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

Response:

The institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching learning process. The institution ensures augmentation of infrastructure facilities continuously. Classrooms, laboratories, staffrooms, rest rooms, seminar hall, reading room, ramps etc. The campus is covered under the CCTV surveillance.

Classroom with ICT: During the last five years classrooms have been upgraded with ICT. Two smarts rooms are available.

Seminar hall with ICT: - The institution has a seminar hall with a 200 seating capacity upgraded with latest ICT for conducting seminars, workshops, guest lecturers etc

Library: The institution has rich collection with 35668 textbooks and 8080 Reference books. The library advisory committee conducts meeting regularly and provides suggestions for further improvements. The library has access to more than 6000 e-journals and 3135000 e- books through INFILBNET, Consortium. The library is equipped with e-LIB software. Internet facility is provided in the library and students can access the e-resources photo copy facility is also available.

Science Laboratory: There are 5 Science laboratories which are fully equipped with required instruments. 2 chemistry, 1 Botany, 1 physics and 1 zoology laboratories. In physics laboratories CRO (Digital), Ballistic Galvanometer, Spectrometer, Planks Constant kit.

In chemistry electronic digital balance, conductometer, potentiometer, PH meter, Colorimeter, centrifuge machine, Analytical machine.

In Botany and Zoology laboratories simple microscope, compound microscope, Binocular Microscope. Hot water bah centrifuge machine, photo colorimeter.

Computer Laboratory: There is one computer lab with 30 computers and LAN connectivity. The whole campus has Wi-Fi facility with 100mbps speed each.

Hostel Facility:

The college has a separate facility for boys and girls.

- Ladies hostel has 1153 sqmt with lower and upper ground floor area. The total built-up are is 2175sqmt. There are 17 rooms in each room 4 students can be accommodated water filter, solar water heater facility and UPS facility for uninterrupted power supply is available.
- **Boys Hostel:** Boys hostel ground floor area 421sqmt with 13 rooms, Each room can accommodated four students. Well equipped rooms with study table chair and separate lockers.

For the effective management of solid waste, the dustbins are placed at different places of the corridor, common rooms, washrooms and hostels. The degradable waste is collected and dumped in the composting pit and non-degradable waste is handed over to municipal waste collecting agencies for its systematic disposal.

• Liquid Waste Management:

Liquid Waste from the washrooms is channelized to the municipal drain and waste water from laboratories is disposed into a closed tank.

• Rain Water Harvesting:

There is an arrangement to collect rain water in to a tank constructed at the left side corner of the building. Such collected rainwater is used for garden.

• Biomedical Waste Management:

Animal dissection has been banned by UGC. Hence, no biomedical waste is generated.

• E-waste Management:

Most of the e-waste is in the form of computers spare parts, components of Xerox machines, printers, etc. This work is collected by the local businessmen.

• Waste Recycling System:

The waste water from RO water purifier is used for garden. The degradable waste is dumped into the huge pit and allowed to decompose in return the manure is used for the garden.

The dangerous chemicals are kept separately and safety norms are used in the laboratory.

- Financial Support to Physically Disabled Students by Alumni: Mr. Sunil Mahendrakar alumni paid the admission fees of Ms.Bhagamma Hebbal who is studying in BA V semester at present
